BOTTOM LINE: IN THE UPSIDE DOWN KINGDOM, HONOR IS GREATER THAN POWER.

### >> MARCH 16

The story behind this verse is fascinating. David prayed this while running for his life from an evil king named Saul who wanted to kill him. While on the run, God didn't rescue David immediately. Instead, God was with David and helped him find a way out of that situation over time. But even though God didn't answer David's prayer immediately, God protected David the entire time he was on the run. So remember, no matter what's going on in your life, God hears your prayers. And even if God doesn't respond the way you expect or in the timing you want, know that just because God seems silent, it doesn't mean that God isn't there. God is with you, listening to you, and working for your good.

As middle/high schoolers, it's can be easy to believe that you don't have a lot of authority right now. And here's a secret: adults often feel the same way! It feels like there is not much we can actually be in charge of in our day-to-day lives. But here's the thing: You have so much more authority than you think! You're in charge of the way you treat people. You're in charge of the way you speak to people. You're in charge of the way you choose to live and interact with others. And if you want to use that authority wisely, you can follow Jesus' guidance here by using your authority to treat others the way you want to be treated.

### >> MARCH 18

When someone does something that hurts us, it's human nature to want to get them back. Payback feels great. So why does Peter say to do the opposite in this letter? Well, Peter had a life-changing experience that made him see everything differently. Not only did Peter know Jesus personally, but Peter hurt Jesus ... personally. But in return, Jesus didn't seek payback. Instead, He forgave him. Jesus showed Peter a way to live that was totally opposite from what he expected.

Today, think about the things people in your family or friend group do that hurt you or get on your nerves. What would it look like to tell them it hurt you in a way that doesn't hurt them in return?

### >> MARCH 19

When you're waiting on something important, it's really hard to trust that everything will be okay. The writer of this verse, David, begins by asking, "How long, O Lord? Will you forget me forever?" (Psalm 13:1). David is still on the run because he's being hunted by King Saul. His circumstances probably left him wondering if the worst would happen. Would he be in danger forever? But, instead of staying stuck in his worry, David reminds himself of something he knows is true: He can trust God's unfailing love, regardless of his circumstances. There's nothing wrong with having questions about life or wondering when God will answer our prayers. But even in our times of question, we can trust God, knowing that God loves us.
